1 Brás Immigrant Hostel

The former Brás Immigrant Hostel was founded in 1887 by the government of São Paulo to house immigrants newly arrived in Brazil. Today, the same building houses the Immigration Museum of the State of São Paulo and the Arsenal of Hope.

2 Rodolfo Crespi Cotton Mill

Industrial complex founded in 1897 by the Italian industrialist Rodolfo Crespi, where the General Strike of 1917 began.

3 Bresser Socks

Factory founded in 1919 by the Italian businessman Fiore Feola.

4 Ypiranga Jafet Spinning, Weaving and Printing

The factory, founded in 1907 by the Lebanese businessman Nami Jafet, is where Romilda Vidal Medvalho's parents (interview featured in the timeline) met.

5 Mariângela Weaving Factory

Company founded in 1903 by the Italian industrialist Francesco Matarazzo. In front of the factory, the Spanish worker Francisco José Martinez was murdered by the police during the General Strike of 1917.

6 Braz Textile Factory

Also known as Paulistana Manufacturing Company, the factory was founded in 1889 by Count Antônio Álvares Penteado.

7 Belenzinho Weaving

Founded in 1911 by the Italian industrialist Francesco Matarazzo, as an expansion of the Matarazzo group's textile industrial complex in the eastern part of São Paulo.

8 Paulista Company of Burlap

Built in 1911 by Count Antônio Álvares Penteado.

9 Tatuapé Textile Factory

Founded in 1929 by the Bunge group, of Dutch origin; it later became part of the Santista Factory ventures.

10 Guilherme Giorgi Cotton Mill

Founded in 1920 by the Italian industrialist Guilherme Giorgi, it was his first factory in the textile sector in São Paulo.

11 Italian-Brazilian Silk Weaving

Founded in 1911 as a partnership between Rodolfo Crespi and Nicola Carbone, and later, in the 1930s, acquired and expanded by Matarazzo United Industries.

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Labor Textile Factory

Built starting in 1910 by the firm Assumpção, Toledo & Cia, in partnership with the Italian businessman Giovanni Crespi.

Maria Zélia Printing and Spinning Factory

Founded in 1912 by industrialist Jorge Street, the factory employed around 2,500 workers and operated with 2,000 looms.

Maria Zélia Workers' Village

Inaugurated in 1917 by Jorge Street as a planned workers' village to house employees of the Maria Zélia Factory and their families.

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Union of Textile Factory Workers

An important labor union organization for textile workers in São Paulo, founded in the early 20th century to defend the labor rights of the sector.
